s mentioned on the front page, the Oxfordshire Network representing CCUK is struggling to continue in the way we have since the Charity was formed nearly 40 years ago. Some of us have been involved since the start so you can imagine how old we are now!

We continue to do the best we can. Crohn's Disease and Colitis can be particularly difficult diseases to cope with. Newly diagnosed patients often struggle to understand what they are faced with and need support and reassurance that they will be able to continue and carry on with the life they want to after the initial diagnosis.

The charity started in 1985 as the National Association for Colitis and Crohn's Disease (NACC), literally out of someone's front room.

It's been called Crohn's and Colitis UK (CCUK) since 2016 and has now grown to be a well respected and award winning national charity recognised as being excellent at supporting sufferers, funding valuable research and campaigning to raise awareness and achieve positive change that benefits members in many different ways.

The Oxfordshire Network works closely with the Oxford University Hospitals, particularly the Gastroenterology Departments at the John Radcliffe and Horton hospitals. In fact Jack Satsangi, one of the Gastro Consultants is our medical advisor.

What are you in for if you decide you wanted to get involved? Well nothing too onerous. The level of activity is very much down to the individual.

We try and have two or three meetings a year although, again mainly due to covid, we haven't achieved that for some time.

We get involved with fundraising, mainly helping and supporting others rather than doing it ourselves these days. However, if you are in a social circle where you would be able to get involved in fundraising events, that would be brilliant, but it would be a bonus, not an expectation.

We are helping to organise the meeting advertised on page 3 and this is typical of the things we get involved in.

Prior to covid we were present at Friday Outpatient Clinics helping patients with any practical issues they were unsure about. Unfortunately that activity has been another victim of covid and today, many such appointments are undertaken via the telephone or a video link so face to face clinics are much less populated.

Any money we do raise or receive from donations goes, in the main, to Head Office but we are allowed to help fund certain things at the local hospitals if asked.

We produce the Newsletter you are reading now and we are available via the telephone, video link, email or even a get together over a cup of tea to help any patient, existing or newly diagnosed. This is mainly in the area of general support, we are not qualified - or able to - give any medical recommendations or advice.

So if you want to get involved, maybe give something back, be amongst like minded people, many who will have gone through similar experience as yourself with regard to health, then get in touch. We like to think we are sociable and welcoming and although it can be daunting to get involved in an environment you are not used to, we're sure you won't regret it.

If you do get involved, there is no obligation to continue if you subsequently feel it's something that doesn't meet your expectations.
